





- 41) What did you find most interesting about this seminar? What did you find most valuable?
- I enjoyed learning about the history of Los Angeles and how it has shaped Los Angeles today. I now look at everything about the Los Angeles area in a racialized way, or in other words, I now understand how race plays a larger role in shaping the Los Angeles physical landscape, as well as the interracial dynamic within the city.
- I felt that the seminar provided a foundation for students to share their perspectives and understandings and overall allowed us to acknowledge the overlapping concept that each topic discussed.
- I found most interesting the depth that we discussed about every topic. Every single week I looked forward to this class because this seminar made me think beyond what high schools only shown through books. Thanks to Jean, the way he taught this seminar was rather intriguing and eye-opening. Professor DeGuzman took it to the next level in his in-depth readings tailored specifically to Los Angeles. The readings granted a new lens to view the world in every week. To view Los Angeles differently opened my mind to newer perspectives that I did not think once about before taking this course.

Most valuable about this course is the professor. The passion in history is there. A professor who can

teach is a good professor, but a professor who loves to teach is one of the best professors. That passionate professor is professor DeGuzman.

Professor DeGuzman always emphasizes the importance of history: to see why the present is what it is and to learn from the past. At the beginning of every lecture, we see this particular lesson applied to the course. Professor DeGuzman has time allotted to a specific activity called 'Housekeeping' in which students and the professor engage in an open dialogue regarding current events. In this discussion, not only do we discuss current events but professor DeGuzman uses his knowledge of history to explain why present events unfold as they do. Here it is evident that JP is a passionate instructor who understands the beautiful side of history and learning.




